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
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
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

Introduction



Direct and Indirect Speech

We use indirect speech when we use our own words to report what someone says.

Changes should be made to the original words when changing from Direct speech to Indirect.

Direct speech: "Did you like the new movie?" said Jeet. Riya said, "It was gripping. I simply loved it."

Indirect speech: Jeet asked Riya whether she liked the new movie. Riya replied that it was gripping and she simply loved it.

Note: Observe the aspects of tenses, Reflexive Pronouns that have undergone changes while transforming direct speech into indirect speech.

Certain meanings will have to be conveyed when converting to Indirect Speech.
